"We Have Applied for Conciliation."

Application for Conciliation Has Been Filed

On Friday September 15, the RAAS Negotiating Team submitted a request to the Ontario Labour Board for Conciliation services.

• The administration has been duly notified.

What Happens Next?

- Within 7-10 days, the Labour Board will appoint a Conciliator.
- The Conciliator will contact the negotiating teams and set some dates for conciliation.
- The Conciliator will sit down with both sides and with the two sides together.
 - The Conciliator's role is not to assess our situation and impose a binding agreement on us, but rather to help the two sides get to voluntary agreement.
- This process will involve 2 or 3 days of conciliation, plus a few days for the Conciliator to issue their report.
- In the meantime, we will continue to negotiate with the aim of getting an agreement or at least narrowing the points of disagreement.

Where Does a Strike Vote Come Into This?

- A strike is a last resort that we hope we will never need, though we cannot ever rule it out.
 - A strike is *not the only option* we would have, should Conciliation not lead to an agreement.
- A strike vote, on the other hand, is an important demonstration of support for the positions the Negotiating Team is taking at the negotiating table.
 - A positive strike vote shows your negotiating team (and the administration) that we are united in where to draw the line in our negotiations.
 - A negative strike vote, conversely, shows the Negotiating Team and administration that RAAS members are prepared to concede.
- A strike vote does not automatically trigger a strike and most often does not lead to a strike at all.
- A strike vote can be called at any time; a strike cannot occur until at least the 17th day following a no board report.
